

Dear Friends in Christ,



The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod has a shortage of pastors. For some years now, the Council of Presidents has not been able to fill calls for new pastors from the seminaries because there have not been enough graduates from Master of Divinity programs to meet the needs. The consequences of this shortage are serious to the life of the Synod in many ways, especially because the shortage of pastors jeopardizes faithful pastoral care to people and thereby diminishes vitality and growth in congregations without a pastor. At the outset it must be said that this is more than an LCMS challenge. Of seminaries accredited by the Association of Theological Schools (ATS), 55 percent report low MDiv enrollments. The reasons for the decline are complex and known. How we turn this around and seize opportunities for growth is less appreciated. Unless we see this contextually, we may indeed increase enrollments but only temporarily. Without a larger contextual vision, our memberships could continue to decline, resulting in diminished LCMS ministry presence in communities of twenty-first-century America. I suggest we recast how we think about the seminaries' enrollment problem.

Dr. Meyer goes on to make this observation and proclamation:

It is one-dimensional to say we need more students. To express that need in fuller contour, I suggest we understand our challenge to be recruiting the next generation of pastors who will lead congregations in the dramatically different twenty-first century. The differences between the American culture in which my home congregation formed me and the coming environment for congregations are amazing. One cultural change among many: Today "most American adults agree that it is a good idea to live with one's significant other before getting married and most adults either currently or have previously lived with their boyfriend/girlfriend." Another change: "There is growing acceptance of porn, particularly among young Americans." [1] As overwhelming is technological change. Ray Kurzweil of Google says, "The twenty-first century will be equivalent to 20,000 years of progress at today's rate of progress." [2] Thomas Friedman describes the impact all this change is having on us. "The rate of technological change is now accelerating so fast that it has risen above the average rate at which most people can absorb all these changes. Many of us cannot keep pace anymore. 'And that is causing us cultural angst.' (Erik Teller)." [3] Congregational angst too. We have lost our privileged place in society. The biblical illiteracy prevalent in American society shows itself in our church members. The "nones" are increasing. Regular worship attendance is now assumed to be once every few months, not every Sunday. You can add to that list, reasons

why the future looks so daunting, but consider this. Many of this year's graduates from Concordia Seminary were eleven-years-old when 9-11 happened. The losses in church life that my generation grieves are not known to tomorrow's future pastors. Our seminarians are Christ-centered, Bible-based, and want to serve and grow the congregations they will be privileged to serve. When a donor asked me, "What's the Seminary doing about millennials?" I first did not know what to say, but I recovered and said, "Our students are millennials. They'll figure out how to minister to their peers." I believe that is true. Our role, yours and mine, is to mentor them in the unchanging truths of God's word so that they will take those truths into the changing world of their coming ministries. The Lord of the church is raising up the next generations of pastors to lead in the challenging times ahead. Please help us recruit the winsome personalities, the keen intellects, and the lovers of Jesus and the Bible for the future.

The article went on to the challenges and hopes that the LCMS has in recruiting pastors for the future.

Teacher recruitment is another challenge.

In the May newsletter of the North Wisconsin District President Duwayne Lueck said this.

This year there were 160 congregations wanting a graduate from the seminary but there were only 100 men available. Next year there may only be around 80 men available. There were over 350 requests for Lutheran school teachers from our LCMS colleges with only 118 teacher graduates. This leaves 230 vacant teaching positions at schools who now need to look elsewhere.

As a congregation we will continue to do our best to encourage our youth to consider church work careers. St. Marks has produced several pastors. Most recently was Rev. Zach Voss who was just ordained in June. Others include Rev. Walt Steinbach Jr., Rev. Dr. James Dretke and Rev. Dr. James Brauer.

St. Marks has also inspired several individuals to go through the Lutheran Teacher's Program. Such individuals include Katie (Kempf) Mortenson, Carolyn (Hornberg) Windmier and Karen (Nemmetz) Fischer. Mrs. Fischer wrote a beautiful letter telling about influence St. Mark had on her decision to pursue a career as a Lutheran School Teacher.

How I hope and pray that St. Marks will continue to encourage the young men and women to consider church work careers. I will do my part by talking about it in Catechism class and scheduling a yearly visit to Concordia University Wisconsin for those who are interested in learning more about such careers. At the same time I hope and pray that parents and grandparents, family members and friends will do what they can to encourage our youth to consider being church workers as well.

NYG NEWS... The theme for the 2019 LCMS Youth Gathering has been announced: **Real. Present. God.** The theme takes its roots in Psalm 46. Here is an explanation about the theme and logo.



GATHERING LOGO

The 2019 Gathering logo is the creation of James Saleska, graphic designer out of Frankenmuth, MI.

"The 2019 LCMS Youth Gathering identity mark is a design treatment of the theme, 'Real. Present. God.' The stenciled treatment reflects the ideas of strength and fortitude to remind us that 'God is our refuge and strength' (Psalm 46:1)," says Saleska. "The bright color palette reinforces the youthful nature of the event and mimics a heat map where the hottest part is centered around the "o" in God reinforcing the Gathering's Christ-centered focus."

Real. Present. God.

Earlier this year on January 15-17, a group of Gathering planners joined by students from Concordia University St. Paul (CSP) met to begin the thematic planning process. They discussed youth and young adult research and trends, reflected on Scripture and prayerfully considered the message of the event.

"Late in the day, there was a point when everyone else stepped back from all the ideas posted on the wall and our group of [CSP] students gathered by them, looking them over and chatting about what resonated and what didn't," said Shelly Schwalm, DCE, CSP campus ministry assistant. "Some of the richest insights came from listening in to that conversation."

"It was a reminder of the importance of encouraging our young people to contribute and giving them a chance to speak while we step back and really hear them," adds Schwalm. "They have much to contribute and teach us about reaching their generation and those following. It's my prayer that this theme translates the Gospel to speak to youth of our time and culture, especially in the challenges they're facing today. God's promises for us are for yesterday, today, and forever."

Seltz Accepts Call to LCRL

Rev. Dr. Gregory Seltz, Speaker of The Lutheran Hour, has accepted a call from the board of the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty (LCRL) in Washington, D.C. to serve as the LCRL's executive director. Seltz is slated to leave his role as Speaker later this summer, though he is committed to fulfilling all duties of the Speaker in the transition months to come.

"It's been a blessing to have Pastor Seltz serve in the long line of gifted speakers who have shared the Gospel with millions over the airwaves since The Lutheran Hour's first broadcast in 1930," says LHM President & CEO Kurt Buchholz. "Pastor Seltz and I are confident that God has a plan for this important ministry that is a critical part of LHM's focus on media outreach. We ask for continued prayers for Pastor Seltz and his family as he transitions into this new role with the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty."



"It has been the greatest honor of my life to follow in the footsteps of Dr. Walter A. Maier, Dr. Oswald Hoffmann, Dr. Dale Meyer, Dr. Ken Klaus, and all the other great speakers on The Lutheran Hour over the past 87 years," says Seltz. "What a privilege to serve the wonderful people of the Lutheran Laymen's League and the churches of the LCMS in carrying out ministry alongside the tremendous and dedicated LHM staff. Together, we have advanced the cause of the Gospel and reached so many people each week on the radio.

"I do believe, though, there exists a great challenge before Christ's church in the current milieu of the American culture. My new position will seek to ensure, maintain, and defend religious liberty protections for our churches, schools, universities, and fellow believers so that the Gospel may indeed have free course in our culture, calling all people to faith in Christ. I believe my work with the National Religious Broadcasters, my previous work with Concordia, Irvine, and my many years in urban ministry have indeed prepared me to engage such things by God's grace and power."

Based in Washington, D.C., the goal of the LCRL is to monitor and protect First Amendment rights in the public square from a uniquely Lutheran perspective.

Since becoming Speaker in 2011, Seltz developed a bold vision for expanding the reach of The Lutheran Hour program through live broadcasts and other twenty-first century media while being in high demand for speaking engagements about evangelism, entrepreneurial leadership development, and team ministry within the city. His well-rounded ministry experience previously included training students at Concordia University in Irvine, California, to launch ministries in a variety of cultural settings; serving as executive director of an urban, not-for-profit evangelism ministry in Manhattan, New York; founding the first new Lutheran mission start in New York City in more than 40 years (Church For All Nations, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod); and planting a mission church in Dallas.

The Lutheran Hour currently reaches more than 1 million people a week. It airs on more than 1,700 radio stations across North America and is also available online, through a mobile app, and on the American Forces Network.
